

SUPERVISION ARRANGEMENTS BEFORE AND AFTER SCHOOL

Student safety at Gaayip-Yagila Primary School is our highest priority and the safe and appropriate supervision of students is an important element of our duty of care to students. Part of this duty is ensuring parents and students are aware of our student supervision arrangements before and after school.

Before school: School grounds are supervised from 8.40am when the school gates are opened. Students are able to enter classrooms from 8.50am and instruction begins at 9.00am. Department guidelines advise that supervision must be provided at least 10 minutes prior to the start of the school day. Our school enables students to be supervised 20 minutes prior to the start of the day.

After school: School grounds are supervised until 3.25pm. Department guidelines advise that supervision must be provided at least 10 minutes after the end of the school day. Our school enables students to be supervised for 15 after the school day is completed.

Students on school grounds outside these times will not be supervised (unless they are attending a before or after school care program or supervised extracurricular activity).

Parents/carers are requested to ensure that students do not attend school outside of these supervised times unless they are attending before or after school care, or a pre-arranged supervised activity (i.e. sports practice). Where students attend outside these hours parents will be contacted and alternative arrangements for supervision may be required.

Families are encouraged to contact TheirCare on 1300 072 410 or refer to their website for more information about the before and after school care facilities available to our school community, or if you would like any further information about our student supervision arrangements.

For a copy of our school's Yard Duty and Supervision Policy please see our school website at gyps.vic.edu.au or contact the administration office. This policy includes Gaayip-Yagila Primary School's student supervision arrangements across the school day, including before and after school.

ENROLMENTS FOR 2024

As a result of the new timeline that has been introduced by the Department of Education, enrolments for 2024 are now due. If you have a child who will be starting Foundation next year it is important that you speak to our administration team this week to complete enrolment forms so that we can plan for anticipated enrolments. If you have a neighbour, friend or relative who lives within our designated neighbourhood (www.findmyschool.gov.au) we ask you to check that they have enrolled their child. If you have any questions, please speak with our administration team.

2024 STUDENT TRANSFER

As we begin to look ahead to 2024, we ask that if you are intending to relocate schools at the end of the year that you please let us know at the below form. 

We completed an activity about how we can be a good friend and wrote about some of the things a good friend does!



I like how we got to write down ingredients for a good friend, instead of a cake - Bishneet Dhesi















Last week, our Grade 3 & 4 students prepared for RUOK? Day which is on the 14th September 2023.

They were also able to model our expectation of Kindness through checking in with each other whilst participating in some fun activities.


















YEAR 2 WRITING

SCIENCE NEWS


In Foundation, students have been revising what they learnt about force and motion. We have been looking at the key vocabulary we've been learning about such as push and pull. We have also thought about and discussed the way different items move. Through fun games, we have thought about and experienced in different ways we move our bodies.





In Year 1 and 2, students have been sharing what they have learnt about Earth and Space Science. They learnt about what a landscape is and how there are different types of landscapes on Earth. They then created an invitation that showcased all of their knowledge from our learning this term. This week, they got creative by using Lego to complete different challenges!







In Year 3 and 4, students have been creating a diorama about night and day. They have been working with partners to create a scene that depicts both day and night for their chosen season, creating the Earth and showing the Earth's tilt, and finally adding a torch (as the sun) to show how the sun creates night and day. Students have been working really hard on these dioramas and are in the final stage of completing them this week. They all look great so far!

In Year 5 and 6, students were working collaboratively to present their research about their chosen planet. They have chosen their own media to present their information and have spent time making their presentations look amazing, really showcasing their research and knowledge of the planets. There have been lots of interesting facts learnt about the planets!


