Supervision Arrangements Before and After school

Student safety at Gaayip-Yagila Primary School is our highest priority and the safe and appropriate supervision of students is an important element of our duty of care to students. Part of this duty is ensuring parents and students are aware of our student supervision arrangements before and after school.

Before school: School grounds are supervised from **8.40am** when the school gates are opened. Students are able to enter classrooms from 8.50am and instruction begins at 9.00am. Department guidelines advise that supervision must be provided at least 10 minutes prior to the start of the school day. Our school enables students to be supervised 20 minutes prior to the start of the day.

After school: School grounds are supervised until **3.25pm**. Department guidelines advise that supervision must be provided at least 10 minutes after the end of the school day. Our school enables students to be supervised for 15 after the school day is completed.

Students on school grounds outside these times will **not** be supervised (unless they are attending a before or after school care program or supervised extracurricular activity).

Parents/carers are requested to ensure that students do not attend school outside of these supervised times unless they are attending before or after school care, or a pre-arranged supervised activity (i.e. sports practice). Where students attend outside these hours parents will be contacted and alternative arrangements for supervision may be required.

Families are encouraged to contact TheirCare on 1300 072 410 or refer to <u>Home | TheirCare</u> for more information about the before and after school care facilities available to our school community or if you would like any further information about our student supervision arrangements.

Re:\$400SchoolSaving Bonus



ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL REPORT Wellbeing Update

Child Safe Policies

Gaayip-Yagila Primary School is committed to creating and maintaining a child safe culture by implementing policies to support protection for children and young people.

Policies have review dates to ensure they are current and updated with any new information. Our school has just completed a review of several Child Safe policies, which had consultation with School Council.

Volunteers and Visitors Policy

Gaayip-Yagila Primary School values the contribution of volunteers and at times will make arrangements for visitors onsite. To provide a safe and secure environment for students and staff, we establish processes to monitor and manage visitors and volunteers. Please see the policies below.



Visitors Policy

Purpose

To provide a safe and secure learning and teaching environment for students and staff by establishing processes to monitor and manage visitors to Gaayip-Yagila Primary School.

Scope

This policy outlines our school's arrangements for visitors who attend school grounds when the school is open for instruction between the hours of 8.30am and 4.00pm and when the office is staffed to monitor/receive visitors at reception including parents, contractors, volunteers or allied health professionals. Outside of these times, our front office is not staffed and this policy does not apply. The only visitors permitted on school grounds are parents/carers or their delegates who are dropping off or picking up students from Outside School Hours Care, school events such as parent teacher interviews, concerts, sport or other school activities, and community and other groups who have entered into contracts or agreements with the school to use school premises outside of school hours.

Definitions

Child-related work: As defined by the *Worker Screening Act 2020* (Vic), child-related work is work that usually involves direct contact (including in person, over the phone, written and online communication) with a child that is a central part of that person's duties. It does not include work that involves occasional direct contact with children that is incidental to the work.

Policy

Gaayip-Yagila Primary School strives to create an open and inclusive school community, and encourages parents and carers to be actively involved in their child's development and education. We also strive to foster strong partnerships with local community services, schools and other organisations.

Gaayip-Yagila Primary School is not a public place. The Principal has the authority to permit or deny entry to school grounds, and encourages all visitors to familiarise themselves with our school's *Child Safety Policy*, *Child Safety Code of Conduct and Volunteers Policy*.

From time to time, different members of the public may visit our school. Visitors may include, but are not limited to:

- Parents
- Volunteers see our school's Volunteers Policy for more information
- Prospective parents, students and employees
- Invited speakers, sessional instructors and others addressing learning and development
- Public officials (e.g. Members of Parliament, local councillors)
- Persons conducting business e.g. uniform suppliers, booksellers, official school photographers,
- commercial salespeople
 Tradespeople
 Children's services agencies



- Department of Families, Fairness and Housing workers
- Victoria Police
- Persons authorised to enter school premises (e.g. Worksafe inspectors, health officers etc)
- Other Department of Education and Training staff (including allied health staff) or contractors
- NDIS therapists or other allied health or health practitioners

Sign In Procedure

All visitors to Gaayip-Yagila Primary School are required to report to the school office on arrival (see exceptions below in relation to parents/carers). Visitors must:

- Record their name, date and time of visit and other relevant details including the purpose of the visit in the administration iPad
- Provide proof of identification to office staff upon request
- Produce evidence of their valid Working with Children Clearance where required by this policy (see below)
 - Follow instruction from school staff and abide by all relevant school policies relating to appropriate conduct on school grounds including the Child Safety Code of Conduct as well as Department policies such as the <u>Sexual Harassment Policy</u> and <u>Workplace Bullving Policy</u>
- Return to the office upon departure to sign out
- Gaayip-Yagila Primary School will ensure that our school's Child Safety Code of Conduct is available and visible to visitors when they sign in.

Working with Children Clearance and other Suitability Checks

All visitors who are engaged in **child-related work** (see definition above) must have a valid WWC Clearance. Additional suitability checks may also be required such as reference, proof of identity, qualification and work history involving children checks.

In some circumstances, visitors to Gaayip-Yagila Primary School who are **not** engaged in child-related work will also be required to produce a valid WWC Clearance depending on the particular circumstances of their visit. For example, Gaayip-Yagila Primary School will require a valid WWC Clearance for:

- **visitors who will be working regularly with children** during the time they are visiting, even though direct contact with children is not a central part of their normal duties
- visitors (e.g. contractors), who will regularly be performing unsupervised work at the school during school hours or any other time where children are present. Further background checks, including references, may also be requested at the discretion of the Principal.



Visitors who will be working in areas away from students (e.g. a visiting auditor who will be located in the front office with administration staff) or who will be supervised and accompanied by a staff member during their visit (e.g. a Member of Parliament, a journalist, a prospective parent on a school tour) will not be required to have a WWC Clearance.

Sworn Victoria Police officers or sworn Australian Federal Police officers are exempt from requiring a WWC Check, but may be asked to verify that they are sworn officers by providing proof of identification.

Invited Speakers and Presenters

On occasion, Gaayip-Yagila Primary School may invite external speakers or providers to deliver incursions, presentations, workshops and special programs for our students. Consistent with Department of Education and Training requirements, Gaayip-Yagila Primary School will:

- ensure that the content of presentations and programs by external providers contributes to the
- educational development of our students and is consistent with curriculum objectives ensure that any proposed visit, programs or content delivered by visitors complies with the requirement that education in Victorian government schools is secular and is consistent with the values of public education, Department policies and the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006* (Vic). In particular, programs delivered by visitors are to be delivered in a manner that supports and promotes the principles and practice of Australian democracy including a commitment to:
 - o elected government
 - O the rule of law
 - O equal rights for all before the law
 - freedom of religion, speech and association
 - the values of openness and tolerance
 - respect for the range of views held by students and their families.

Parent Visitors

We understand that there may occasionally be a reason why a parent or carer may want to speak to or see their child at school, during school hours. If there is a particular pressing or unavoidable issue that cannot wait until the end of the school day, we ask that parents or carers call the school office to make the request to speak to or see their child during school hours. We also ask that parents avoid arranging to visit their children at school wherever possible, as this can cause inappropriate disruptions to the school day. All parents or carers who visit our school during school hours, other than for the purposes of school pick-ups and drop-offs or for specific school events (e.g. parent teacher interviews, concerts, assemblies etc), are required to sign in as a visitor at the school office.

Parents or carers who are prohibited from entering the school under a court order or direction of the Principal are not permitted to visit the school. Our school maintains and provides office staff with a list of restricted parents/carers which may include identifying photographs and any other information as required depending on the level of risk posed.



Other Visitors

All business operators, tradespeople and other visitors attending the school to conduct work must report to the school office upon arrival for instruction and follow the sign in procedure outlined above.

Communication

This policy will be communicated to our school community in the following ways:

- Available publicly on our school's website
- Included in induction processes for relevant staff
- · Discussed in an annual staff meeting
- Made available in hard copy from school administration upon request

Volunteers Policy

Purpose

To outline the processes that Gaayip-Yagila Primary School will follow to recruit, screen, supervise and manage volunteers to provide a child safe environment, and to explain the legal rights of volunteers.

Scope

This policy applies to the recruitment, screening, supervision and management of all people who volunteer at our school.

Definitions

Child-connected work: work authorised by the school governing authority/provider of a school boarding services and performed by an adult in a school or school boarding premises environment while children are present or reasonably expected to be present.

Child-related work: As defined by the *Worker Screening Act 2020* (Vic), child-related work is work that usually involves direct contact (including in person, over the phone, written and online communication) with a child that is a central part of that person's duties. It does not include work that involves occasional direct contact with children that is incidental to the work.

Closely related family member: parent, carer, parent/carer's spouse or domestic partner, stepparent, parent/carer's mother or father in-law, grandparent, uncle or aunt, brother or sister, including step or half siblings.

Volunteer worker: A volunteer school worker is a person who voluntarily engages in school work or approved community work without payment or reward.

School work: School work means:

- Carrying out the functions of a school council
- Any activity carried out for the welfare of a school, by the school council, any parents' club or association or any other body organised to promote the welfare of the school
- Any activity carried out for the welfare of the school at the request of the Principal or School Council
- Providing assistance in the work of any school or kindergarten
- Attending meetings in relation to government schools convened by any organisation which receives government financial support

This is a broad definition and means that volunteers who participate in school community activities, such as fundraising and assisting with excursions, are legally protected (ie indemnified) from action by others in the event of an injury or accident whilst they are performing volunteer school work in good faith.



Policy

Gaayip-Yagila Primary School is committed to implementing and following practices which protect the safety and wellbeing of children and our staff and volunteers. Gaayip-Yagila Primary School recognises the valuable contribution that volunteers provide to our school community and supporting the work we do.

The procedures set out below are designed to ensure that Gaayip-Yagila Primary School's volunteers are suitable to work with children and are well-placed to make a positive contribution to our school community. **Becoming a Volunteer**

Members of our school community who would like to volunteer are encouraged to contact the main administration either via telephone or email outlining request.

Suitability Checks including Working with Children Clearances

Working with Students Gaayip-Yagila Primary School values the many volunteers that assist in our

classrooms, with sports events,

excursions and other programs or events. To ensure that we are meeting our legal obligations under the *Worker Screening Act* and the Child Safe Standards, Gaayip-Yagila Primary School is required to undertake suitability checks which in most cases will involve asking for evidence of a Working with Children (WWC) Clearance and may also involve undertaking reference, proof of identity, qualification and work history involving children checks.

Considering our legal obligations, and our commitment to ensuring that Gaayip-Yagila Primary School is a child safe environment, we will require volunteers to obtain a WWC Clearance and produce their valid card to the office for verification in the following circumstances:

- **Volunteers who are** not parent/family members of any student at the school if they are engaged in child-related work regardless of whether they are being supervised.
- **Parent/family volunteers** who are assisting with any classroom or school activities involving direct contact with children in circumstances where the volunteer's child is **not** participating, or does not ordinarily participate in, the activity.
- Parent/family volunteers who assist with excursions (including swimming), camps and similar events, regardless of whether their own child is participating or not.
- Parent/community School Council members sitting on School Council with student School Council members, regardless of whether their own child is a student member or not.

In addition, depending on the nature of the volunteer work, our school may ask the volunteer to provide other suitability checks at its discretion (for example, references, work history involving children and/or qualifications). Proof of identity may also be required in some circumstances.



Non-Child Related Work

On some occasions, parents and other members of the school community may volunteer to do work that is not child-related. For example gardening, maintenance, school council, participating in sub-committees of school council, fundraising groups that meet in the evenings] during which children will not be, or would not reasonably be expected to be, present.

Volunteers for this type of work are not required to have WWC Clearances or other suitability checks as they are not engaged in child-related work and children are not generally present during these activities. However, Example School reserves the right to undertake suitability checks, including requiring proof of identity and WWC Clearance, at its discretion if considered necessary for any particular activities or circumstances.

Training and Induction

Under the Child Safe Standards volunteers must have an appropriate induction and training in child safety and wellbeing.

To support us to maintain a child safe environment, before engaging in any work where children are present or reasonably likely to be present, volunteers must familiarise themselves with the policies, procedures and code of conduct referred to in our Child Safety Induction Pack and ensure the actions and requirements in these documents are followed when volunteering for our school.

Depending on the nature and responsibilities of their role, Gaayip-Yagila Primary School may also require volunteers to complete additional child safety training.

Management and Supervision

Volunteer workers will be expected to comply with any reasonable direction of the Principal (or their nominee). This will include the requirement to follow our school's policies, including, but not limited to our Child Safety Policy and our Child Safety Code of Conduct.

Volunteer workers will also be expected to act consistently with Department of Education and Training policies, to the extent that they apply to volunteer workers, including the Department's policies relating to Equal Opportunity and Anti-Discrimination, Sexual Harassment and Workplace Bullying.

The Principal (or their nominee) will determine the level of school staff supervision required for volunteers, depending on the type of work being performed, and with a focus on ensuring the safety and wellbeing of students.

The Principal has the discretion to decide about the ongoing suitability of a volunteer worker and may determine at any time whether or not a person is suitable to volunteer at Gaayip-Yagila Primary School.



Privacy and Information Sharing

Volunteers must ensure that any student information they become aware of because of their volunteer work is managed sensitively and in accordance with the Schools' Privacy Policy and the Department's policy on Privacy and Information Sharing.

Under these policies, student information can and should be shared with relevant school staff to:

- support the student's education, wellbeing and health;
- reduce the risk of reasonably foreseeable harm to the student, other students, staff or visitors;
- make reasonable adjustments to accommodate the student's disability; or
- provide a safe and secure workplace.

Volunteers must immediately report any child safety concerns that they become aware of to a member of staff to ensure appropriate action. There are some circumstances where volunteers may also be obliged to disclose information to authorities outside of the school such as to Victoria Police. For further information on child safety responding and reporting obligations refer to: *Child Safety Responding and Reporting Obligations Policy and Procedures*.

Records Management

While it is unlikely volunteers will be responsible for any school records during their volunteer work, any school records that volunteers are responsible for must be provided to the nominee to ensure they are managed in accordance with the Department's policy: Records Management – Schools.

Compensation

Personal Injury Volunteer workers are covered by the Department of Education and Training's Workers'

Compensation Policy

if they suffer personal injury in the course of engaging in school work.

Property Damage

If a volunteer worker suffers damage to their property in the course of carrying out school work, the Minister (or delegate) may authorise such compensation as they consider reasonable in the circumstances. Claims of this nature should be directed to the principal who will direct them to the Department's Legal Division.

Public Liability Insurance

The Department of Education and Training's public liability insurance policy applies when a volunteer worker engaged in school work is legally liable for:

- a claim for bodily injury to a third party
- damage to or the destruction of a third party's property.



Communication

This policy will be communicated to our school community in the following ways:

- Available publicly on our school's website
- Included in induction processes for relevant staff
- Included as a link in all invitations to prospective volunteers

Every day counts!

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day of school that a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes and social friendships. Coming to school every day is vital.

Parents are legally required to ensure their child attends school every day and to provide an explanation for their child's absence from school.

Cultural Partnerships

The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students of GYPS have had a fantastic time connecting with each other and our visiting artists Peru and Sermsah. Peru is from Wurundjeri Woi Wurrung Country and Sermsah is a Nyikina man from the Kimberlys. Peru and Sermsah have created opportunities to celebrate the strength and potential of our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and provided cultural learning and awareness from their knowledge. They have discussed the resilience of the Aboriginal people over time and supported our group to demonstrate respect to each other and pride in themselves when dancing, creating art or connecting with each other.

The students have learnt a dance telling the story of the Rainbow Serpent and how the rivers and mountains were formed according to Aboriginal Dreamtime story. They have created artworks and played games. They have sat in a yarning circle and learnt aspects of Aboriginal history and language – and played games and shared morning tea too! There have been lots of laughs and some firm friendships forming across all ages. The students have had the opportunity to meet weekly and really look forward to the time together and getting to know each other.

Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students are looking forward to our End of Year celebration where we will come together with our families and share in an afternoon tea.











STUDENT ARRIVALS

As we continue to strive for excellence in education, I would like to remind everyone of the importance of punctuality in our daily school routine.

Classrooms open at 8:50am, and it is crucial that all students are in class and ready for learning by 9.00am. This ensures that they can fully benefit from the day's lessons and activities. Repeated lateness has a well-documented negative impact on student learning and the overall effectiveness of our school programs. It disrupts not only the late student but also their classmates and teachers.

We understand that mornings can be challenging, but we ask for your cooperation in ensuring that all students arrive on time. Your support in this matter is greatly appreciated and will contribute significantly to the success of our students and the smooth operation of our school.

Over the past 2 weeks 24% of students were late to school at least once during this time. 5% of students were late at least 5 days over the 2 week period.

VISUAL ART NEWSLETTER

Years 1-2

Students in Years 1-2 are learning the basic skills of painting with acrylic paint. They are discovering how to hold their brush correctly, how to apply paint, how to mix colours to create new colours and are having so much fun mixing shades and tints by applying black and white paint to their paint colour of choice. These students are creating a painting inspired by American artist Sari Shryack who enjoys painting landscapes, people, plants and everyday objects. We are producing creative landscapes which show students ability to mix acrylic paint to create light and dark colours of the same hue (colour).

Smile Patrol offers free dental care checks and necessary general treatments to eligible students at school during regular hours through our mobile dental service. Students who qualify under the Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS) can receive various dental treatments, including tooth cleaning, x-rays, fissure sealants, and fluoride application tailored to their specific needs. For a detailed understanding of these treatments, please refer to the dental treatment guide on the next page. Once a check up has been done we will email you a dental treatment care plan.

*(Free - if eligible under the CDBS, Non eligible students will have an option of having treatment that does incur private costs)

What are Dental Treatment Care Plans?

We'll provide you with a dental care plan that outlines the treatment your child received and any additional recommendations, if necessary. This plan will help you stay informed about your child's dental care and guide you on any further steps that may be needed. The plan will be emailed to the email address you provided in the online consent form.

Follow up:


If follow up treatment is needed, we will contact you to obtain informed consent and make recommendations. You are free to follow up with us or with your own dentist.

Do parents, legal guardians, or carers need to attend a student's appointment?

Parents, legal guardians, or carers are welcome to accompany their child during the appointment if they wish. If additional treatment is required, we may request the presence of a parent, legal guardian, or carer during the appointment to ensure clear communication and support.

What if a student has received recent dental treatment? If a student has recently had dental care, they can still be seen by Smile Patrol. Depending on their individual needs, they may not require x-rays or other preventive services. Smile Patrol can become the student's regular dental provider, visiting your school annually and more frequently for those students who require it.

Missed the Dental Visit? Don't Worry, We've Got You Covered! If your child could not be seen on the scheduled day but you still want them to have a check-up, feel free to reach out to us. If we are still at your school, we may be able to arrange another appointment on a different day. In case that doesn't work, we can gladly book your child at our dental clinic in Preston for a convenient visit. We're here to ensure your child receives the dental care they need, even if plans change. Free checkups cannot be guaranteed unless your child is eligible under the Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS). The Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS) offers eligible children aged 0-17 years funding of \$1,095 for preventative dental treatment. This is renewed every 2 calendar years. This service is covered by Medicare, meaning you do not have to pay for it. To learn more, visit

https://www.servicesaustralia.gov.au/child-dental-benefits-schedule. You can also check your child's eligibility and CDBS balance through your Medicare online account at myGov, or by calling 132 011.

Smile Patrol will verify your child's eligibility before treatment. Upon an initial examination (88011), the Medicare amounts for each service we may provide are in the table below including Medicare pricing for fissure seals.

What dental treatments will be provided and what do they mean?

Dental check-ups or examinations:

A child's dental check-up is an important visit where the dentist examines the child's teeth, gums, and mouth for any issues. It's crucial for parents to prioritize these visits to ensure their child's oral health and prevent dental problems.

Risks: None X-Rays of teeth:

Dental x-rays are essential for children's oral health, as they help dentists detect tooth decay, evaluate tooth development, identify alignment issues, and create personalized treatment plans.

Risks: Dental x-rays are very safe, with significantly lower radiation levels compared to everyday sources like background radiation, medical diagnostic procedures, and air travel. The controlled doses and protective measures in dental x-rays ensure that the benefits outweigh the minimal radiation risk.

Fluoride application:

Fluoride application to children's teeth is important as it helps strengthen tooth enamel, making it more resistant to decay. It also helps prevent cavities and promotes overall dental health, ensuring children have a strong foundation for lifelong oral well-being. **Risks:** Allergies to fluoride are exceptionally rare. However, if the child has allergies to band-aids, rosin, or casein (milk protein), fluoride application may not be possible.

Fissure Sealants

Fissure sealants are important for children's teeth as they protect against cavities by creating a barrier that prevents food and bacteria from getting trapped.

Risks: Allergy to fissure sealants

Tooth Cleaning:

A dental scale and clean involves a thorough cleaning by a dentist to make teeth sparkle and feel fresh. Special tools are used to remove plaque build-up and tartar including those hard-to-reach areas. It's a deep cleaning that promotes dental health and keeps your children's smile shining bright!

Risks: Minimal risk, slight gum trauma or bleeding.


