

#### **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS**

Over the holidays, we have seen some exciting works begun at school:

**Nature Walk** – During the April holiday period, the space between the rear of the Year 4 portables and the playground has been begun its transformation into our new Nature Walk. ID Landscaping has done a fantastic job bringing this project to life. I encourage you to talk a walk along the path and identify the animal footprints.

In collaboration with CERES, toward the end of Term 2, a variety of tube stock grasses will be planted by students to create an inviting, sustainable outdoor learning and reflection space for our students. To help protect the smaller, newly planted vegetation as it establishes, we will have bunting in place as a visual reminder for students to avoid walking through the area. We look forward to this space becoming a valuable and much-loved part of our school grounds.

#### **Outdoor Seating**

Between the Science portable and the playground we have also put down a concrete pad. We are awaiting the arrival of 3 bench seats which will be installed in this space. This is expected in the coming 3 - 4 weeks. This will provide students with a place to sit, take a break between active play, and connect with friends in a social and accessible area adjacent to the playground. It offers a practical and welcoming space for students to gather, chat, and recharge before heading back to class.

This outdoor project has been overseen by Sally Hill, one of our Leading Teachers responsible for Specialised Projects.

#### Ramps rectification works

Over the past 18 months, we have been working closely with the Victorian School Building Authority (VSBA) and associated consultants regarding the ramps located across our school site. Following thorough assessments, some of our ramps were found to be non-compliant with current safety and accessibility standards.

Over the coming weeks the 'VSBA Ramp Rectification Project' will address these concerns. The majority of rectification works were originally scheduled for completion during the recent school holiday period, however, works did not commence as expected and will now be undertaken during the school term. To ensure student safety temporary fencing will be placed around areas that works are being undertaken.

We look forward to the completion of these works to ensure student, staff and families safety.

## Attendance Matters - Every Day Counts

Since the COVID-19 pandemic, student attendance has become a growing challenge across all schools, with more families choosing to keep children home for non-essential reasons—including birthdays, travel, and minor illnesses. While some absences are unavoidable, consistent attendance is crucial for student learning, wellbeing, and long-term success.



At Gaayip-Yagila Primary School, our dedicated wellbeing team has worked hard to reverse this trend. We are proud to report that in 2024, only 42% of our students had 20 or more days absent—an improvement from previous years, and notably better than both similar schools (47%) and the network average (46%), and close to the state average of 39%.

### Attendance Matters - Every Day Counts...cont

By the end of Term 1 we have already had 7% of students absent for more than 20 days. **13% of students have not had any absences during the first term.** Well done to those students on being present at school every day.

We thank families for their partnership in making this improvement possible and encourage ongoing commitment to daily school attendance. Every day at school builds knowledge, routine, friendships, and confidence. Learning happens from the beginning of the school day, right up until students leave at the end of the day and missing even the last session of (2:20–3:10pm) can add up over time. We understand that late drop offs and early pick-ups are sometimes necessary, but regular early departures mean students miss out on key learning, end-of-day routines, and reminders.

We kindly ask families to schedule appointments outside school hours where possible and take family holidays during term breaks. If your child has high absences or you are facing challenges with regular attendance, please reach out—we are here to support you.

Let's continue working together to ensure every student gets the most out of every school day.



## Reminder: Safe Driving and Parking Around School

The safety of our students, families, and staff is our top priority. We kindly remind all members of our school community to follow road rules and park safely and legally around the school grounds. Please avoid parking across driveways, near school crossings, or in no-stopping zones, as this can create dangerous situations—particularly for children walking, riding, or being pushed in prams.

We also ask all drivers to slow down, stay alert, and be patient during dropoff and pick-up times. A few extra minutes can make a big difference in keeping our community safe.

Thank you for helping us create a safe and respectful environment for everyone.

### Reminder: Riding to School

A reminder to all parents that students riding bikes or scooters to and from school must wear a helmet at all times. Wearing a helmet is not only essential for your safety, but it is also a legal requirement in Victoria.

Additionally, riders must be at least 16 years of age to use an eScooter. Students who arrive at school without a helmet or who are using an eScooter will not be permitted to ride home at the end of the day, and a parent or carer will be contacted to collect the bike, scooter, or eScooter. We appreciate your support in keeping everyone safe and ensuring these important rules are followed.

### How BYOD is Enhancing Classrooms at GYPS









Amazing Australian Rainforesti

Did you know Australia has very old rainforests? One of them is called the Daintree Rainforest.

In this rainforest lives a very special bird called the cassowary. It's a glant bird that can grow as tall as some grown-ups if even has big claws that look a bit like a dinosaur's.

Cassowares are very important for the rainforest. They eat big fruits, and when they poo, the seeds in the poo help new plants grow. This helps lots of different plants to survive. Because the cassowary helps so many plants, we call it a keystone species. That means it's very important—if you take it away, the whole ecosystem may collapsel

- Now, there's a problem in the rainforest. Animals called feral pigs have come. Now, there's a problem in the rainforest. Animals called feral pigs have co to live there. These pigs werent originally from Australia: people brought them here is long time ago. Now, there are lots of them — may be even millions across Australia!

  These feral pigs cause trouble. They dig up the ground looking for food, which can wash away the soil when it rains. This makes it hard for trees to grow strong.

  The pigs also eat the same fruits that the casso-waries like to eat. This means there is less food for the casso-waries like to eat. This means there (called chicks). There aren't many casso-waries left in Australia, only about 2,000, so this is very worrying.



If the cassowaries disappear, it would be bad for the rainforest because many plants need them to spread their seeds. If the plants disappear, then other animals that rely on those plants might also be in danger. Lots of native animals in Australia are in danger because of animals that don't belong there, like feral pigs. These are called invasive species, and they are a big problem.



· We need to try and help the cassowaries and the rainforest by stopping the feral pigs from causing so much damage. If we don't, we might lose these amazing birds forever!

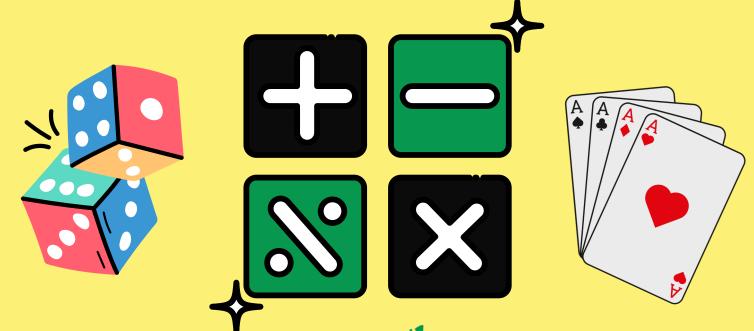

## What's been happening in Auslan?

It's been an exciting second term in our Auslan classrooms, with students continuing to build on their skills and deepen their understanding of this beautiful language. Here's a quick update on what each group has been focusing on:

Our Foundation students have continued their exploration of Auslan letters, numbers, colours, and animals following the Little Learners Love Literacy (LLL) structure.

Students in Years 1 and 2 have been learning about the importance of HOLM (Handshape, Orientation, Location, Movement) and Non-Manual Features (facial expression and body language) in Auslan. They've discovered how these components help convey meaning and are now applying their knowledge to the signs they are learning.

In Years 3–6, students have been continuing their exploration of HOLM/NMFs and how these elements shape the way we sign in Auslan.

Students from Foundation to Year 6 have all started to learn the song 'My Island Home' for a special assembly performance later this term.

We are so proud of all our students for their continued enthusiasm and commitment to learning Auslan.
