

Understanding phonics: a helpful guide for families, parents and carers

Reading is a foundational life skill and a source of pleasure and wonder.

It is one of the most important skills children learn and the teaching of **phonics** plays an important role in helping them become confident, fluent readers. This guide will help you understand what phonics is, why it is important in learning to read, and how children can be supported at home to develop their awareness of sounds, and of the relationships between sounds and letters.

What is phonics?

Phonics includes linking sounds (called 'phonemes') to their corresponding letters (called 'graphemes'). Students read words by recognising the relationships between written symbols and their corresponding sounds.

Phonics is one of 6 components that make up a comprehensive reading program.

The other components are:

Oral language	Knowing and using spoken words to express knowledge, ideas and emotions
Phonemic	The knowledge of sounds
awareness	(phonemes)
	Understanding words in
Vocabalary	isolation and in context
	Reading accurately and at
Fluency	an appropriate rate with expression
	Making meaning from text
Comprehension	which includes developing knowledge of grammar

These are the foundational skills that have a reciprocal relationship and are all necessary to enable students to independently read and respond to increasingly complex fiction and non-fiction texts.

Why is phonics instruction important?

Research and evidence show that phonics instruction is a highly effective way to teach children to read. It helps them develop decoding skills (translating printed words into speech), which assist in reading unfamiliar words. Phonics gives many children the tools to figure out new words and understand spelling patterns, building their reading fluency and comprehension.

How is phonics taught in schools?

The key elements of phonics are:

- 1. Phonemes: the smallest units of sound in speech (e.g., the sound /k/ in 'cat').
- 2. Graphemes: the letters, or groups of letters, that represent these sounds (e.g., the letter 'c' in 'cat').
- 3. Blending: combining individual sounds together to read a word (e.g., /c/ /a/ /t/ = 'cat').
- 4. Segmenting: breaking down words into their individual sounds to spell them (e.g., chat = /ch/a/t).

Phonics is taught through a structured, sequential approach where children learn the simplest sounds (such as /s/, /a/, and /t/ and gradually move to more complex sound-letter patterns (such as /ee/, as in the sound in the word 'bee' and /oa/ as in the sound in the word 'cloak'. This is known as teaching using a systematic, synthetic phonics approach. In simple terms, children learn different sounds, then practice blending sounds together to read words.

Learning phonics at home

Print this list out and stick it on the wall or the fridge, so you can practice phonics with your kids at home.

Read together

Choose books that interest your child and spend time reading aloud together.

Phonics bingo

Create bingo cards with etters, sounds, or words
As you call out the sound (phoneme) or word, children mark it off the corresponding card.

Memory games

Use flashcards with letters and images that start with the corresponding sounds on them. Have children turn them over and try to find matching pairs of letters and images e.g.

Cc and cat.

I spy

Play 'I spy' focusing on sounds and letters. For example, 'I spy with my little eye something that begins with the sound /b/.'

Sand or salt trays

Encourage children to trace letters in sand or salt trays while saying the sound.

Playdough letters

Encourage children to form letters with playdough and then say the corresponding sound as they make each letter. This can be extended by using the letters to form words and sound them

Hopscotch with sounds

Draw a hopscotch grid outside, with each square containing a letter. Children hop on the squares and say the corresponding sound of that letter aloud, reinforcing learning with movement.

Phonics songs

Find fun phonics songs online that help children remember sounds through repetition and music.

Nursery rhymes and poems

Rhyming helps children recognise sound patterns. Encourage them to point out rhyming words and identify the sounds and letters that the rhyming words share.

Sound hunt

Ask children to find objects around the house or classroom that start with a certain sound or letter. For example, 'Can you find something that starts with /s/?'

Word hunt

Hide cards with letters or words around the room, and have children search for and read them out aloud as they find them.

Letter collage

Have children cut out pictures from magazines of items that start with a specific sound. They can create a collage for each letter sound.

Phonics jump

Write letters on pieces of paper, place them on the floor, and have children jump to the correct sound as you call it out.

Sound labels

Label objects around the house or classroom with their phonemes (sounds). For example, place a label on the door with the sound '/d/,' and encourage children to sound it out each time they pass by.

Sound of the day/week

Make one sound
(phoneme) the 'sound of
the day' or 'sound of the
week' and encourage
children to listen for it in
conversation, TV shows, or
books over that time
period.



ROAD SAFETY

Parking and Drop off around our School

The City of Hume is aware of concerning driver behaviour at school drop off and pick up times in the streets around our school. Please note that in the past few weeks the City of Hume has been undertaking regular patrols to ensure parking compliance outside of the school. Any breaches observed, have been enforced and parents will receive fines in the mail.

This is to help ensure the safety of students and staff and the broader school community. We encourage all road users to ensure that they adhere to the law to maintain the ongoing safety of everyone involved.

Remember that it is dangerous to allow your child walk across the road and not use the designated school crossing or to double park and let your child exit the car out on the street.

It is also helpful to keep moving if there is not a park where you want one. It is likely that there may be a park further up the street or around the corner. Stopping unnecessarily causes congestion and frustration for other road users while also impacting on the safety of our student crossing the road when cars stop for lengthy periods and wait for others to move on.

Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge

The Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge is now open and Gaayip-Yagila Primary School is excited to be taking part! Students will receive their logins next week.

The Challenge is open to all Victorian children from birth to Year 10 and aims to help young readers develop a lifelong love of reading. It is not a competition; it is a personal challenge for children to read a set number of books by 5 September 2025.

Children from Prep to Year 2 are encouraged to read or 'experience' 30 books with their parents and teachers. Children from Year 3 to Year 10 are challenged to read 15 books.

All children who meet the Challenge will receive a certificate of achievement signed by the Victorian Premier and former Premiers.

CELEBRATE NEURODIVERSITY

<u>Neurodiversity Celebration Week</u> is from Monday 17 March to Sunday 23 March, and Autism Acceptance Month is in April. These are great opportunities to celebrate the strengths of our autistic students and other diverse learners, recognise challenges they may face and learn more about how we can support them.

Our school is committed to understanding, including and celebrating our diverse learners and value the contribution they and their families make to our school.

About Neurodiversity Celebration Week

Neurodiversity Celebration Week is a worldwide initiative that celebrates the strengths and talents of people who think and learn differently. It also reminds us of the importance of being kind, accepting and inclusive of everyone.

About one in 5 children has variations in their brain development. These variations include those seen in autism, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), dyslexia and dyscalculia. These children can be described as diverse learners.

Autism Acceptance Month

Autism Acceptance Month in April is a chance to celebrate, support and include autistic students. It is an offshoot of the United Nation's sanctioned World Autism Awareness Day on Wednesday 2 April 2025.

To mark Neurodiversity Celebration Week and Autism Acceptance Month, we would like to share some resources that support inclusion that have been developed for the Department of Education by autistic-led organisations and lead researchers in autism and neurodiversity:

- <u>I CAN Education</u> has tips for becoming a champion for neurodivergent students and a <u>graphic</u> novel to help students navigate high school
- Yellow Ladybugs' <u>All Brains are Different</u> program introduces the concept of neurodiversity in an affirming way
- <u>AllPlay Learn's Inclusive School Communities:</u> Monash University's AllPlay Learn team has developed resources on how to create inclusive school communities where everyone feels welcome and supported
- Amaze has produced <u>videos and fact sheets for parents</u> on how to include families of autistic children
- <u>Positive Partnerships</u> runs webinars and has practical tools and information sheets to support autistic students.

More support for autistic students

The department has established the <u>Diverse Learners Hub</u> to meet the needs of diverse learners. The hub provides evidence-based advice and resources on best-practice inclusive teaching practices <u>for supporting autistic students</u> and other diverse learners.
