


























Fundraising Committee

WATTLE DAY

Wattle Day - September 1st

Spring is in the air, and with it comes the golden bloom of our beloved wattle trees, a symbol of beauty, abundance, diversity resilience and unity.

What is Wattle Day?

Wattle Day, celebrated on the 1st of September, is a day that holds a special place in the hearts of Australians. It marks the arrival of Spring and the blossoming of the golden wattle, our national floral emblem. But Wattle Day is more than just about flowers; it's a day to celebrate our shared identity, our connection to the land, and the spirit of community.

Just as Australia is the land of the wattle with a great diversity of different wattles (more than 1,000 Acacia species unique to this land), it is also home to Australians with a great diversity in their backgrounds. (e.g.29.3% of all Australians were born overseas while more than half (51.5%) of the population have a parent born overseas, according to the 2021 Australian Census.'

History of Wattle Day

The first official Wattle Day was celebrated on September 1, 1910, in Sydney, New South Wales, and in Adelaide, South Australia. Wattle Day was not just about the flower; it became a day to celebrate Australian nationalism, nature, and the unique qualities of the Australian landscape and people.

The day was marked with ceremonies, the wearing of wattle sprigs, and other festivities that emphasized the unity and pride of the Australian people. The celebration quickly spread to other parts of the country, with Queensland and Victoria also adopting the day in the years that followed.

In 1912, the golden wattle was officially declared the national floral emblem of Australia. This reinforced its significance as a symbol of the nation's identity. During World War I, Wattle Day took on an even deeper meaning, as the wattle became a symbol of remembrance and resilience. Australians would wear sprigs of wattle to honour soldiers who had died in the war, and wattle branches were sent to soldiers overseas as a reminder of home.

In 1988, as part of Australia's Bicentennial celebrations, the golden wattle was officially proclaimed the national floral emblem by the Commonwealth Government. This helped to revive interest in Wattle Day, and in 1992, the first day of September each year was <u>officially proclaimed 'National Wattle Day' throughout Australia</u> by the Governor-General of Australia.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP @ GYPS

Student leadership is not confined to a small group of individuals, as leadership potential is inherent within all learners. Student leadership includes listening to and being able to clarify the issues of the students they represent and advocating on their behalf. Student leaders have an increased sense of responsibility to help others and to model leadership principles and values. Trust, autonomy and relationships are enhanced through the development of leadership qualities. This year, our student leaders have been particularly active. Their dedication and hard work have not only made our school a better place but also inspired their peers to get involved.

Junior School Council

At GYPS our Junior School Council plays an important role at our school. Through the JSC, students are actively encouraged in decision-making, empowered to make change and provided with opportunities to demonstrate good leadership and citizenship skills. We also discuss issues concerning our students and ways of improving our school. We seek to resolve these issues through reporting and receiving feedback from each class.

For the first half of the year JSC students were provided with opportunities to develop their organisational skills learning how to minute take, chair meetings and work cooperatively with each other. They have also worked on communicating and understanding how to represent other students within the school. Some ideas the JSC have come up with include having a suggestion box where students are able to put in ideas to improve our school.

This term the JSC have been busy shining the spotlight on preventing bullying in our school community by participating in Bullying No Way – National Week of Action (12-16 Aug). Students conveyed a daily message to students across the PA system and shared quick short activities with teachers to reinforce our message "Everyone Belongs". Some JSC members ran a lunch club to create posters with students. Our superstar Peer Mediators also



handed out stickers to students in the yard when they observed them demonstrating our school expectations during the week. They looked very professional with their purple t-shirts

On Thursday, 22 Aug JSC members will be collecting a gold coin donation for our superhero dress up day. All funds raised will be donated to Bully Zero who help fund the roll out of bullying prevention programs in schools across Australia.





Peer Mediators

The Peer Mediators support our younger students in the yard with minor disagreements, running errands for teachers (such as taking students to first aid) and even helping students to find someone to play with. They are roles models in demonstrating our Expectations of Kindness and Collaboration and the younger students know they can go to them for help. The Peer Mediators looked out for students who helping students belong at school – by including them and speaking respectfully and gave out stickers to these students this week!

Young ICT Explorers

In 2024, Aradhya, Cleo and Rehatnoor from Year 4 will be representing GYPS at the Young ICT Explorers competition in September. They will be our inaugural entrants for the very first time. Young ICT Explorers (YICTE) is a non-profit competition, created by SAP, supported by CSIRO Digital Careers and The Smith Family with the help of Industry and University



partners across Australia, to encourage primary and high school students in years 3-12 in Australia to solve real-world problems or showcase their passions using technology.

VISUAL ARTS NEWSLETTER

YEARS 1-2

Students in Years 1-2 are learning the basic skills of painting with acrylic paint. They are discovering how to hold their brush correctly, how to apply paint, how to mix colours to create new colours and are having so much fun mixing shades and tints by applying black and white paint to their paint colour of choice. These students are creating a painting inspired by American artist Sari Shryack who enjoys painting landscapes, people, plants and everyday objects. We are producing creative landscapes which show students ability to mix acrylic paint to create light and dark colours of the same hue (colour).

Year 3-6

Students in the upper years have begun expanding on their ability to draw and paint with acrylic paint. They are learning how to mix white and black to a colour of their choice to create further colours – called tints and shades. Students have been having lots of fun mixing a range of colours, both light and dark to create their masterpieces. Students in Year 3/4 have drawn cacti and just begun painting their good copy, while the year 5/6 students are creating large disco balls- showcasing a multitude of shades and tints of their original colour. We are so proud of them all and cannot wait to see how they all look once finished.
















LIBRARY NEWSLETTER


