

# LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Families,

Welcome to Term 3 Week 1. I hope all our families had a restful and enjoyable Winter school holiday break. It's been wonderful to see the energy and enthusiasm our students have brought back with them as we begin another busy and productive term. Term 3 is often a time of significant learning growth, and we are looking forward to continuing our strong focus on student engagement, wellbeing, and achievement in the 8 weeks ahead.

Last night we held our Annual General Meeting (AGM), where we shared the 2024 Annual Report with our school community. The report highlights key achievements, progress against our Annual Improvement Plan, and our ongoing commitment to student learning, wellbeing, and community engagement. The Annual Report is now available on our school website for families who were unable to attend and would like to learn more about our school's progress and priorities.

Today, our Year 3 and Year 5 families received their child's individual student report for this year's NAPLAN testing. The report includes your child's achievement in numeracy, reading, writing, spelling and grammar and punctuation assessed based on four proficiency levels as follows:

- Exceeding
- Strong
- Developing
- Needs additional support

These reports also show the students' progress compared to their peers. They will indicate the students' skill levels compared to national averages and where we would expect them to be in order to get the most out of their schooling. This information is valuable for teachers, as it helps them understand how to best support your child. While each set of NAPLAN results is an important milestone, it's crucial for students to know that one result does not define them. These results are meant to ensure that every student receives the support they need to continue learning effectively.

### Key Reminders for Term 3:

- Winter Uniform: Please ensure students are wearing the correct uniform. If you need assistance, please contact the administration team. They may be able to assist with second hand uniform.
- Punctuality: A reminder that the school day begins promptly at 8.50am. Arriving on time helps students start the day in a positive and settled way.
- Term 3 Events: Keep an eye on upcoming events in the calendar, including Year 5 Camp, Book Week, Writing Expo, Parent-Teacher Interviews and numerous sporting events.
- Health & Hygiene: With winter illnesses circulating, we encourage families to keep unwell children at home and notify the school of absences via Xuno.
- Parent Engagement: We welcome families to continue engaging with the school through upcoming events and classroom activities.

# Road Safety around Schools

Speed zones, pedestrian crossings and parking restrictions around school are there to improve the movement of traffic during peak times and maximise safety for children and road users. During the Summer holiday period our school crossing on Blackmore Road received an upgrade. The school crossing is now raised and aims to slow cars travelling along Blackmore Road.

It is vital as adults, we lead by example and set good road safety practices travelling to and from school. As such, we are asking all parents and carers to observe and obey parking signs.

Hume City Council have asked us to remind our school community that it is an offence to:

- double park by stopping next to a legally parked vehicle, even for a short time or to drop off /pick up passengers
- stop or park on the centre median strip (Blackmore Road
- stop or park across a driveway or footpath (especially down our side streets this has been occurring)
- stop or park within 10 metres of an intersection or corner that doesn't have traffic lights
- stop or park across or in a bus zone.

Council Local Laws Officers will be active around our school area to issue warnings and fines.



# **Policy Updates**

At our School Council meeting on Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> July, we consulted and ratified several key school policies to ensure they remain current and aligned with Department of Education requirements. These included:

- Asthma Policy
- Anaphylaxis Policy
- Complaints Policy
- Student Dress Code
- Preventing and Addressing Racism in Schools Policy.

All reviewed policies will be available on the school website for families to access in the coming days. We encourage our community to stay informed about these important guidelines that help us maintain a safe, inclusive, and supportive environment for all students.

# New Preventing and Addressing Racism in Schools Policy

The Education Department released the <u>Preventing and Addressing Racism in Schools</u> policy which must be implemented into schools from the beginning of Term 3.

The policy covers 3 key actions:


- 1.Preventing racism: schools must maintain culturally safe and inclusive environments.
- 2.Responding to racism: schools must have clear, timely, safe and inclusive processes to respond to incidents of racism.
- 3.Reporting racism: schools must report incidents of racism

### **Enrolments for 2026**

Foundation enrolments for 2026 are now due. If you have a child who will be starting Foundation next year it is important that you speak to our administration team this week to complete enrolment forms so that we can plan for anticipated enrolments. If you have a neighbour, friend or relative who lives within our designated neighbourhood (<a href="www.findmyschool.gov.au">www.findmyschool.gov.au</a>) we ask you to check that they have enrolled their child. If you have any questions, please speak with our administration team.

Once our enrolments are confirmed, we can plan our transition program and offer sessions and times to enrolled families. Our transition program will begin from October 12<sup>th</sup> 2025.



# **International Day of Friendship**

### When is International Friendship Day 2025?

International Friendship Day 2025 is celebrated on 30th July, and it's recognised on the same day every year.

### What is International Friendship Day?

In 2011, the UN declared the 30th of July as International Friendship Day. Celebrations of friendship are held across Australia to mark this special day each year.

The UN felt that friendship between peoples, countries, cultures and individuals could be a source of inspiration. Focusing on friendship and human solidarity, they hope to foster peace and build bridges where needed within communities.

### Sharing the human spirit through friendship

Friendship is regarded as the important gateway that builds bonds and develops camaraderie and trust between people.

The simple action of building friendships is seen as the shift that is urgently needed in society to achieve lasting peace. The UN and UNESCO believe this would put an end to division, poverty, violence, and human rights abuses.

### How to celebrate International Friendship Day 2025

It's such an important day to take part in. Plus, it's powerful to know that you're contributing towards positive change for everyone.

- **Celebrate your friends** Show existing friends how special they are. Your children might like to send their pals a <u>personalised card</u> or a note. Your students could even make some friendship bracelets to gift to their friends.
- **Socialise** You could set aside time during the school day for your students to spend quality time together. Children could hang out with their existing friends or chat with new people. Use resources such as our <u>Ice Breaker Game Cards</u> and <u>Conversation Starter Dice Activity</u> to help your young learners along.
- What makes a good friend? Talk about what it means to be a good friend. Use this worksheet to help your children think about the qualities they appreciate in their friends. Do they have those qualities too? How do they think they could be a better friend?
- Visit someone You could link up with a group in the local community, such as a charity or a retirement home. Some of your students could visit them to celebrate International Friendship Day 2025 together, spreading joy within the community.



Dear parents, guardians and carers

### Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- · category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. ### **SSG Meetings**

### **NCCD**

The NCCD is an annual collection of information about Australian school students with disability. The NCCD enables schools, education authorities and governments to better understand the needs of students with disability and how they can be best supported at school. The Wellbeing Team has worked with teachers to moderate the level of adjustments implemented in their teaching practice to provide support to students.

### **Canine Comprehension**

Last term, selected Year 5/6 students participated in the Canine Comprehension program. Students worked closely with a trained therapy dog (Victor) and their handler (Mini) to learn about friendship, emotions and responsibilities.

Over four weeks, students took part in an intensive program where they learned about the responsibilities of caring for a dog and how to show respect for Victor, the therapy dog. Students completed Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) focusing on building confidence, developing empathy and exploring how to be a good friend. Mini helped the group to use rewards to train Victor to sit, drop, come and shake paw, they even worked together to teach him a brand-new trick of through the tunnel!

We are very excited to have Victor and Mini back this term working with a new group of Year 3/4 students starting next week.
