

LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Families,

Welcome to Term 4 Week 4.

Last week I had the pleasure of attending the Year 5 and 6 camp at Arrabri on Thursday. Our students had an amazing time and should be commended for their willingness to participate in activities and uphold our school expectations.

A big thank you to the Year 56 team who organised a successful camp and provided students with such a positive experience. I would also like to thank our Education Support staff, Aleisha Morandin, Cathy Simmons, Kathy MacRae and Marc Radoslovic-Clemente who volunteered to attend, along with parent volunteers, Luke Brownley and Tony Kiefer in supporting our teaching staff. These events would not be possible without this support. The camp was enjoyed by all, with my personal highlight watching students work together on the Giant Swing and challenge themselves and their fears on the Giant Swing and Flying Fox. Breakfast Club

Student Support Group Meetings

Please note that our Term 4 Student Support Group (SSG) Meetings will be scheduled soon. Our School Nurse will be contacting families with their allocated time (please note that this will be when the classroom teacher is available). All meetings will be held via WebEx (an invite link will be sent prior to your meeting). If you would like Allied Health or other services to attend, please call the school on 9216 3200, and our KESO Penny Norris will again be invited to all Koorie SSG's. This SSG time is a fantastic opportunity to build upon our strong partnerships with families by working on Individual Education Plans together.

Wellbeing Lessons

Students participate in Wellbeing Lessons each week as part of their classroom program. We follow the Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships Program Framework which is a research-based framework that develops student's social, emotional, and positive relationship skills. The learning materials are planned by our Student Managers so that all classes have the same focus – for the first 5 weeks of this term the focus has been Personal Strengths. The lessons have focused on students identifying and describing personal strengths, explaining how these strengths contribute to family and school life, and identify ways to care for others, including ways of making and keeping friends.

Grade 2's had fun demonstrating and practising their strengths in these teamwork activities!



2024 CLASS CREATION

At this time each year, we will outline the class placement process. The placement of students into classes for next year is a complex and important one. The process works as follows:

Data Collection from Teachers

Our teachers make a balanced judgement on each student in their class within the following areas:

- Academic ability
- Learning behaviours
- Additional needs

'Who do you work well with?'

Our students will be asked to nominate 5 other students who they 'work well with' in their year level. Please note a couple of things:

- We do not use the word friends here. Students don't always necessarily work
 well with some of their closest friends. That doesn't mean they won't be in
 the same class together; what we're focusing on here is student's
 educational relationships, more so than friendships.
- Your child will be in a class with at least one of the 5 students they nominate. We do not account for whether that child was listed first or fifth on the list, if they are a boy or a girl, or if they were in another class this year.
- On very rare occasions, your child may not be able to be paired with someone from their list. We will contact you and discuss this with you further if this is the case.

It may be beneficial to talk with your child prior to our teacher collecting this information about how they best identify other students who they work well with. Our teachers will also have a discussion with their class before the students complete this part of the process.

Parent Requests

- No requests will be considered regarding teachers.
- In an extremely limited number of cases, there may be an educational, health or wellbeing reason for your child to be separated or paired with another child. This may include:

- A child with additional needs who will be supported by positive ongoing relationships with their peers.
- A child who has been involved in ongoing and targeted incidents where another child has negatively targeted and / or impacted their learning and / or wellbeing.
- Requests from parents must be:
- Sent to the Gaayip-Yagila Primary School email address (<u>gaayip.yagila.ps@education.vic.gov.au</u>), addressed to Cassandra Hoggins and with the subject line 'Class Placement 2024'.
- Received no later than close of business Friday 3rd November (no late submissions will be considered).

To be clear, I expect very few, if any, requests from our families. Our teachers and leadership team know our students in great depth and I trust them and the knowledge they have to make considered judgements regarding class placement.

2024 CLASSES

Our classes for next year will be formed with the following priorities:

- Students with at least one peer from their nominated 'who you work well with' list.
- Classes with a balance of;
 - Students working 'above', 'at' and 'working towards' academic level.
 - Gender.

Our classes for next year, including teachers, will be announced on the state-wide transition day, Tuesday 12th December. All students will have an opportunity to spend time with their new class and teacher on this day.

In my experience, this process is comprehensive, considerate and best prepares our students for a positive start to the following school year. Of course, on occasion, there might be some disappointment for a few of our students. They might miss a particular friend or be anxious about leaving a favourite teacher. As the adults, it is our responsibility to support them through this. I am aware of occasions at other settings where families have made requests regarding their child's class following the 'orientation day'. To be clear, that will not happen at our school. Instead, if there is some initial disappointment, we will enact our school values and work collaboratively with kindness and respect to ensure our students and families feel supported and prepared for the transition into 2024.

As you can appreciate class placement is a very complex undertaking, especially in light of our total school enrolment in excess of 1000 students for 2024. At Gaayip-Yagila Primary School, we strongly believe it is essential for children to have the opportunity to make new friends, as this experience often leads to wonderful new friendships and stronger social skills.

If anything I have outlined is unclear, please do not hesitate to contact me for further clarity. I look forward to working through this process together with the intention of providing our students with the best possible learning platform to begin 2024.


WORLD TEACHERS DAY

ASTHMA AND HAY FEVER

Thunderstorm Asthma - Be prepared this pollen season

Grass pollen season, which typically runs from October to December each year in Victoria, brings an increase in asthma and hay fever symptoms. It also increases the risk of thunderstorm asthma. For people with asthma or hay fever, especially those who experience wheezing or coughing with their hay fever, thunderstorm asthma can be sudden, serious and even life threatening.

Gaayip-Yagila Primary School will implement a range of measures to keep our school community safe as the risk of thunderstorm asthma increases.

Many of our staff are trained in asthma first aid, and we will monitor the VicEmergency app to receive thunderstorm warnings, and, where appropriate, keep students indoors when weather forecasts identify greater risk. We had students remain inside at the first break on Wednesday 24th October due to the strong winds.

During the season, there are some things you can do to prepare and protect yourself and your family:

- If your child has ever had asthma, talk to your doctor about what you can do to help protect them from the risk of thunderstorm asthma this pollen season, including updating your asthma action plan. Taking an asthma preventer properly and regularly is key to preventing asthma, including thunderstorm asthma.
- If your child has hay fever, see your pharmacist or doctor for a hay fever treatment plan and check if you should have an asthma reliever puffer. These are available from a pharmacy without a prescription.
- If your child has hay fever and experiences wheezing and coughing, it is important to make sure they don't also have asthma. Speak to your doctor about an asthma action plan.
- Where possible, avoid being outside during thunderstorms from October to December, especially during the wind gusts that come before the storm. Go inside and close your doors and windows. If you have your air conditioning on, turn it to 'recirculate'.

Protect yourself this pollen season – managing asthma and allergies matters.

12 MONTHS FREE INTERNET AT HOME

Support your childs education

The Australian Government has established the School Student Broadband Initiative to provide free home internet for one year for up to 30,000 eligible families with school-aged students.

The initiative aims to boost education opportunities. NBN Co is leading the rollout of this initiative across the country.

How the School Student Broadband Initiative can help your child

Children who can access online learning at home as part of their education are more likely to engage in classroom activities.

Access to fast internet at home can also support children to build their digital skills, learn how to safely use the internet and take part in a world that is more reliant on digital technology.

Eligibility

To be eligible, families must:

- have a child living at home enrolled in an Australian school in 2023
- not have an active National Broadband Network internet service at their home* (having a mobile internet service does not affect eligibility)
- live in a premises that can access the National Broadband Network through a standard connection. NBN Co will check this for you after you apply
- register interest with your school and complete a consent form to be assessed for eligibility.

*If an address has been disconnected within 14 days prior to an eligibility check – the address will be classified as ineligible. There may be cases where exceptions can be made, please contact the School Student Broadband Initiative team at SSBI@education.vic.gov.au to discuss further.

Support your childs education

How the School Student Broadband Initiative works

If you are eligible, your home internet service will be provided at no cost for one year with a participating internet provider over the National Broadband Network. Each internet provider has its own step-by-step process to get you connected, which may involve you providing identification.

Once you sign up, the internet provider will help you set up your connection. The initiative does not include devices such as a computer or tablet. Other members of your household can use the internet service provided through this initiative.

The one-year period will start from the day your service is activated with your chosen provider. At the end of the one-year period, you will not be placed onto a paid service by your internet provider without your consent. The Australian Government is considering options beyond the one-year free period.

How to apply

- Ask your school for a copy of the School Student Broadband Initiative consent form.
- Complete the consent form and return to the school.
- NBN Co will use student address details on the consent form to confirm eligibility.
- If you are eligible, NBN Co will issue a voucher for your family to use to sign up with a participating internet provider. This will be provided to you by your school.

Please note: NBN Co will review the home address for eligibility. No personal information other than your main home address will be shared with NBN Co. Please see the consent form for details about how personal information will be used.


EXCURSION NEWS








SCIENCE NEWS

We are thrilled to share some exciting highlights from our classrooms as our students continue to dive into their learning adventures. Here's a snapshot of what each year group has been up to:

Foundation Students Explore the World of Chemical Science

Our youngest learners have kicked off their journey into Chemical Science. They've been busy discovering and describing the unique properties of various materials, from the flexible to the rough, soft, fluffy and hard. One fun activity involved choosing a material to adorn a special party hat. How creative!







Year 1/2 The Importance of Water
