

Dear Families

Welcome to Term 2 Week 7! It's been a busy couple of weeks at Gaayip-Yagila Primary School, with our Education Week activities, Education Support Personnel Day, Essendon Football club clinics and Year 4 Swimming to name a few events!

This week is Reconciliation Week which - is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia. The National Reconciliation Week theme for 2024, **Now More Than Ever**, is a reminder to all of us that no matter what, the fight for justice and the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people will - and must - continue. Across the week students took part in a range of activities in order to learn more about Reconciliation and our traditional custodians of the land. Further information about the importance of the week can be found later in the newsletter.

Covid is again making its unwelcome presence felt, with multiple staff and students currently absent from school for this reason. Please assist us by keeping your child home if they are experiencing flu-like symptoms. Assisting children to practice washing their hands and sneezing or coughing into elbows are small strategies that can assist with reducing the spread of illnesses.

We have had some beautiful weather this week, however it is getting colder, and this is a good time to remind children about dressing appropriately for the weather such as wearing the uniform jumper, long pants and a black jacket.

#### National Reconciliation Week

National Reconciliation Week—held every year from 27 May to 3 June—is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

#### What's the significance of 27 May and 3 June?

27 May marks the anniversary of the 1967 referendum when Australians voted to remove clauses in the Australian Constitution that discriminated against Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

3 June marks the historic 1992 Mabo decision in which the High Court of Australia recognised native title—the recognition that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' rights over their lands did survive British colonisation.

The day before National Reconciliation Week, 26 May, is National Sorry Day, which was first held in Sydney in 1998 and is now commemorated nationally to remember and honour the Stolen Generations.

#### What is reconciliation in relation to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples?

At its heart, reconciliation is about strengthening relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Indigenous peoples, for the benefit of all Australians.

For Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, Australia's colonial history is characterised by devastating land dispossession, violence, and racism. Over the last halfcentury, however, many significant steps towards reconciliation have been taken.

Reconciliation is an ongoing journey that reminds us that while generations of Australians have fought hard for meaningful change, future gains are likely to take just as much, if not more, effort.

#### Why is National Reconciliation Week important?

National Reconciliation Week provides a focus for working towards our goal of a just equitable and reconciled Australia

National Reconciliation Week is an ideal time for organisations, schools, universities, community groups and workplaces to advance understanding of reconciliation within their own places and their own lives. National Reconciliation Week provides a focus for working towards our goal of a just equitable and reconciled Australia

It began as a Week of Prayer for Reconciliation in 1993, supported by Australia's major religious groups. Three years later it evolved into National Reconciliation Week under the guidance of the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation (now Reconciliation Australia).



#### Who organises National Reconciliation Week?

National Reconciliation Week is organised by Reconciliation Australia; an independent, not-for-profit organisation established in 2000. It is the national organisation responsible for building and promoting reconciliation between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and other Australians.

Reconciliation Australia creates a theme for National Reconciliation Week each year.

Reconciliation Australia also works with state reconciliation organisations in New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria, Western Australia, South Australia and the ACT to organise local events and activities for National Reconciliation Week.

Thousands of workplaces, schools, early learning services, universities, councils, and more organise their own private or public activities for National Reconciliation Week.

#### How can I or my group or organisation get involved?

Visit the Reconciliation Australia website for more information and to discover what activities and events are taking place in your local area during National Reconciliation Week

On a personal level, you can think about what you can do locally and take the time to learn about the rich Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures that exists in Australia.

And, importantly, find the time to talk with your family and friends about why it's important for all Australians to build respectful relationships with each other, and especially with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

#### What can I do for the rest of year?

While National Reconciliation Week is an excellent time to think about these issues, you can still take action through the year to work towards reconciliation.

# ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL REPORT CURRICULUM UPDATE

Throughout the beginning of this year we have worked extremely hard with staff to upskill them to provide a positive change in our approach to teaching mathematics. In our continuous effort to enhance the learning experience and academic success of our students, we have adopted the Explicit Direct Instruction (EDI) method for our mathematics curriculum. This decision stems from our commitment to providing the best possible education, tailored to meet the needs of every student.

#### What is Explicit Direct Instruction (EDI)?

Explicit Direct Instruction is a structured, systematic, and effective approach to teaching. It emphasizes clear, direct teaching of concepts and skills with a focus on achieving measurable learning outcomes. Lessons are designed to be clear and unambiguous, ensuring that every student understands the material being taught before moving on to more complex topics.

#### **Benefits of Explicit Direct Instruction:**

#### Clarity and Focus:

EDI provides clear and concise instruction, minimizing confusion and making it easier for students to grasp new concepts. Teachers break down complex ideas into manageable steps, ensuring that each student can follow along and understand the material.

#### Immediate Feedback:

One of the core elements of EDI is the provision of immediate feedback. This allows teachers to quickly address any misunderstandings or errors, reinforcing correct procedures and promoting a deeper understanding of mathematical concepts.

#### <u>Active Participation:</u>

EDI encourages active student engagement throughout the lesson. By continuously checking for understanding and involving students in guided practice, teachers can ensure that every student is actively learning and participating in the classroom.

#### **Structured Practice:**

The method incorporates both guided and independent practice. Students first practice new skills with the teacher's support and then apply what they have learned independently. Working with your child to reinforce these skills at home supports their learning in school.

EDI emphasizes mastery of foundational skills before progressing to more advanced topics. This approach ensures that students have a solid understanding of basic concepts, which is crucial for success in higher-level mathematics.

#### Differentiated Instruction:

Teachers can easily tailor EDI lessons to meet the diverse needs of their students. By monitoring student progress and adjusting instruction accordingly, teachers can provide additional support or challenge as needed, ensuring that all students are able to succeed.

#### <u>Improved Academic Performance:</u>

Studies have shown that students taught using EDI methods often demonstrate improved academic performance. The structured, clear, and focused nature of EDI helps students achieve better outcomes in mathematics, setting them up for long-term academic success.
