LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Families.

Welcome to Term 3 Week 8!

We hope everyone had a lovely weekend and enjoyed celebrating their dad's and father figures in their lives. This week we have seen the weather be quite unpredictable with the strong winds. On a number of days, we have had students remain inside for their safety. Students are welcome to bring a quiet activity such as colouring in, a deck of cards or a simple game such as Spotto to school for use during this time. Please ensure items are named so they can be returned if lost.

On Tuesday, 27th August, Hanna Spark and I, along with Department of Education regional staff, visited the Islamic Museum of Australia in Thornbury. The visit was an enriching experience aimed at increasing our understanding of Islam and promoting inclusivity within our schools and the wider community. We look forward to applying the knowledge gained to further enhance inclusivity at our school across our many cultures.

Recently, behaviour management expert Dan Petro worked closely over 2 days with our staff to enhance classroom practices aimed at improving student engagement. Dan conducted classroom observations and provided valuable feedback to teachers, helping to refine strategies for managing student behaviour effectively. He also collaborated with our leadership and wellbeing teams on functional behaviour assessments, offering insights and guidance to support individual student needs. This partnership has been instrumental in building a positive learning environment and ensuring every student has the best opportunity to succeed.

Our Year 2 students have been attending their excursion to Ripponlea Estate throughout the week, where they have explored the beautiful gardens and historic mansion. The excursion has provided a wonderful opportunity for students to learn about life in the past, and the importance of preserving heritage sites. Through interactive activities and a guided tour, students were able to engage with history in a hands-on way, sparking curiosity and deepening their understanding of our local history. It was a memorable experience that brought their classroom learning to life! We hope that our final 2 classes have a great day tomorrow.

As announced in the 2024/25 Victorian Budget, the School Saving Bonus provides a one-off \$400 support for students in Victoria in Term 4, 2024, for use on 2025 school costs. Please see further information in the newsletter regarding this initiative.

Re:\$400SchoolSaving Bonus

Families want the absolute best for their kids. But with the current cost of living – uniforms, camps, sports and more - it all adds up.

That's why the Allan Labor Government is making life that little bit easier for families, by providing a one-off \$400 School Saving Bonus.

Every student enrolled in a Victorian government school for the 2025 school year will receive \$400 support.

It will help cover the cost of school uniforms, textbooks, and school activities like camps, excursions and sports.

You don't need to apply.

From November 2024, parents and carers will receive an email from the Department of Education providing details on how they can access the \$400 bonus.

The \$400 School Saving Bonus is available for each child. That means a family with three school-aged children will receive a total of \$1,200.

The School Saving Bonus is available in addition to other financial support including the Affordable School Uniforms program and the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund.

Sunsmart - Hats

MOON FESTIVAL



The Moon Festival, also known as the Mid-Autumn Festival or Zhongqiu Jie (中秋节) in Chinese, is a traditional harvest festival celebrated in several East Asian countries, including China, Vietnam, Taiwan, and others. It typically falls on the 15th day of the 8th month of the lunar calendar, which usually corresponds to late September or early October in the Gregorian calendar.

Historical and Cultural Significance

The festival dates back over 3,000 years, when people would worship the moon to express gratitude for the harvest. Over time, it evolved into a celebration of family reunion, thanksgiving, and prayer for good fortune. The moon, particularly when it is full and bright during this time of year, symbolises completeness, unity, and prosperity.

Customs and Traditions

- **Mooncakes**: One of the most iconic features of the Moon Festival is the sharing of mooncakes, which are round pastries filled with various sweet or savory fillings like lotus seed paste, red bean paste, or salted egg yolk. The round shape of the mooncake symbolizes the full moon and family unity.
- **Moon Gazing**: Families gather in the evening to admire the full moon, which is believed to be at its brightest and most beautiful on this night. Some also make wishes for health, happiness, and prosperity while watching the moon.
- Lanterns: Lanterns play a significant role in the festival, especially among children who carry them while walking around at night. In some regions, there are also lantern displays and lantern-making competitions.
- Offerings and Worship: In traditional practices, people make offerings to the Moon Goddess, Chang'e, who is a central figure in the festival's mythology. Fruits, mooncakes, and incense are common offerings.
- **Mythology**: The legend of Chang'e is a popular story associated with the Moon Festival. According to the myth, Chang'e was the wife of a famous archer named Hou Yi. She drank an elixir of immortality and ascended to the moon, where she lives to this day. Her story is remembered and honoured during the festival.

Modern Celebrations

Today, the Moon Festival is celebrated not only in East Asia but also in many other parts of the world where Chinese communities reside, including Australia, the United States, and Europe. In places like Melbourne, the festival has become a multicultural event, featuring food, music, dance performances, and community activities that bring people together to celebrate Asian culture and heritage.

STUDENT ARRIVALS

As we continue to strive for excellence in education, I would like to remind everyone of the importance of punctuality in our daily school routine.

Classrooms open at 8:50am, and it is crucial that all students are in class and ready for learning by 9.00am. This ensures that they can fully benefit from the day's lessons and activities. Repeated lateness has a well-documented negative impact on student learning and the overall effectiveness of our school programs. It disrupts not only the late student but also their classmates and teachers.

We understand that mornings can be challenging, but we ask for your cooperation in ensuring that all students arrive on time. Your support in this matter is greatly appreciated and will contribute significantly to the success of our students and the smooth operation of our school.

Over the past 2 weeks 24% of students were late to school at least once during this time. 5% of students were late at least 5 days over the 2 week period.

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL REPORT Curriculum Update

Phonics Instruction

At Gaayip-Yagila Primary School, we have always recognized the importance of explicitly teaching phonics as a foundation for literacy. This year, however, we have further refined our phonics instruction through targeted professional learning. Our dedicated teaching staff have deepened their understanding of effective phonics practices, ensuring that all students in Foundation to Year 2 receive daily, explicit phonics instruction. This focused approach, which emphasizes both encoding (spelling) and decoding (reading) words, aligns with the Department of Education's recommended 25 minutes of daily phonics teaching. By implementing these refined practices, we are providing our students with the essential skills needed for their reading and writing development.

Reporting

We are thrilled to share with our community the highlights of this term, starting with the fantastic success of our recent Parent-Teacher Interviews. The interviews provided a valuable opportunity for open dialogue between parents and teachers, helping to build strong partnerships in support of our students' learning journeys.

Looking ahead, we are excited to announce that our ongoing reporting will be released in **Week 10**. This comprehensive report will allow parents to see how their child has performed against the skills taught over the past five weeks. Along with this, we will provide practical examples and suggestions on how parents can support these learning goals at home. Whether it's through reading together, practicing math skills, or engaging in inquiry-based activities, we aim to empower families to play an active role in their child's education. This partnership between school and home is crucial for fostering long-term success.

Additionally, in **Week 9**, our teachers will be participating in a dedicated planning day. This day is vital as it allows our educators to review student data and reflect on what has been achieved so far. By carefully analysing student progress, we can make informed plans for **Term 4**, ensuring that our teaching strategies are tailored to meet the needs of every child in our classrooms. This time is essential for fine-tuning our approach and ensuring that we continue to provide the highest quality of education to our students.

What's been happening in Auslan?



Our Foundation students have been busy learning how to express their feelings using Auslan emotion signs. It's been wonderful to see them enthusiastically engage with this new vocabulary, helping them to communicate and understand emotions in a unique way.

In Years 1-2, students have continued to build on their knowledge of emotion signs and are now also learning to sign numbers up to 20. They are making great progress, and it's exciting to watch them grow in confidence as they master these new signs.



Our Years 3-6 students have been expanding their skills by learning to sign numbers up to 100. Additionally, they've been diving deeper into Deaf culture, exploring how to create inclusive environments. As part of their current project, students are designing a Deaf-friendly house. They're incorporating innovative features such as bed shaker alarm clocks and doorbells with flashing lights, learning firsthand how thoughtful design can make a significant difference in daily life.

It's been an inspiring term, filled with new knowledge and creative exploration!


