

# **2024 ENROLMENT INFORMATION**

Enrolments are being accepted for 2024. A Statewide timeline for enrolling in Foundation for the 2024 school year has been established, with guidelines around dates being mandated. Therefore, if you have a child starting primary school in 2024, it is time to enrol. Every application must be submitted before Friday 28th July 2023. If you currently have a child attending Gaayip-Yagila Primary School and a new sibling beginning in 2024, your child will be prioritised at our school as per the Department's Placement Policy. We encourage you to contact the school administration office at your earliest convenience to complete an enrolment form (you will require your child's birth certificate or passport and their Medicare Immunisation Certificate).

Our school tours run each fortnight and places are limited. If you know of families who are considering enrolling their child into Foundation at Gaayip-Yagila Primary School next year, please direct them to the enrolment page on our website or have them contact our administration team.








#### Wellbeing in Classrooms

# **NAIDOC WEEK**



National NAIDOC Week celebrations are held across Australia in the first week of July each year (Sunday to Sunday), to celebrate and recognise the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. NAIDOC Week is an opportunity for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth. You can support and get to know your local Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander communities through activities and events held across the country.

The 2023 theme is For Our Elders.

# CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

The Department administers the CSEF to help eligible families with the costs of camps, sporting activities and excursions. Payments for 2023 are \$125 per year for eligible primary school students. The payment is made directly to an eligible student's school. *Applications are to be received by the school no later than 23 June 2023*.

Some common examples of school-organised programs for which a CSEF payment may be used include:

- School camps/trips
- Swimming and other school-organised sporting programs
- Outdoor education programs
- Excursions/incursions.

#### Eligibility for the CSEF

- Families holding a valid means-tested concession card or temporary foster parents are eligible to apply. A special consideration category also exists.
   Schools can receive applications from families by 23 June 2023.
- Families can list more than one student in the one application form if they are attending the same school.

#### Submitting an application

A parent/carer will only be required to submit an application form to the school in the following circumstances:

- The parent/carer is applying for the CSEF payment for the first time i.e. an application form was not lodged with the school in the previous year, or
- Circumstances have changed for example, there has been a change in the care arrangement of the student, a change of name or CRN, or a new sibling has started at the school and the parent/carer wishes to apply for the CSEF payment for the new sibling also.

# **VISUAL ART NEWS**

In Visual Arts, we have been wrapping up our weaving units, and putting or finishing touches on our assessment tasks. The students have been working so hard on their pieces, and are very excited to show them off at the first GYPS art show, which will take place in Term 4 – keep an eye out for more information coming soon!

Foundation students have completed the bodies of their woven animals and are now using collage and drawing techniques to add decorations and details. Year 1 and 2 students have been focusing on different types of patterns are using a range of materials to decorate the borders of their paper rugs, inspired by Azerbaijani artist Faig Ahmed.

Year 3 and 4 students have been working hard to finish their circular weaving, inspired by Barkindtji, Yorta Yorta and Dhudaroah artist Tegan Murdock. Students have focusing on developing their weaving skills and understanding of complementary and analogous colours, and those who finish early have had the opportunity to create their own pompoms and add them to their weavings. Year 5/6s are beginning to finish their wall hangings inspired by artist American artist Emma Freeman, continuing to explore analogous and complementary colours. Some students are also experimenting with other fibre art techniques, adding fringe, pompoms and beading to their work.

Finally, Term 1 artwork will start making it's way home to you next term, so keep an eye out for those masterpieces!

### **SCIENCE NEWS**

As we celebrate the end of another term, we also approach the end of a semesters work in Biological Science for our Year 1-6 students, and the end of Biological Science and Earth Space Science for Foundation. We would like to thank the GYPS staff, students and community for welcoming Science as a specialist subject. We would especially like to thank the students for staying curious and excited with their new learning.

Foundation students have completed their learning on the Earth's natural resources, identifying as least two examples from home and at school. They celebrated with an incursion from Mad About Science and a special Science Day. Thank you to those parents who could attend!

Our Year 1 and 2 scientists have been applying their knowledge of fossils and have been looking at the difference between trace fossils and body fossils. Students have also been lucky enough to create their own 3D body fossil using air dry clay.

Year 3 and 4, students are understanding the impact humans have on living things and have investigated greenhouse gases. Students then participated in a whole class experiment to determine which combination of ingredients will produce the most gas. They wrote up a scientific report which included a hypothesis, materials, procedure (method), observations and conclusion.

Agriculture has been our focus in Year 5/6, with students learning to understand about sustainable crop production. They identified what farmers need to grow crops, what crops are produced in Victoria and learnt that sustainable crop production is all about growing crops in a way that protects the environment and ensures that we can continue to grow food for years to come.

Next semester we will be studying Earth Space Science for Year 1-6 and Physical and Chemical Science for Foundation!

# **WICKED WEATHER SCIENCE INCURSION**

We are thrilled to share the exciting events of our recent Foundation Science Day, which was held under the captivating theme of 'Wicked Weather'. Our young scientists embarked on a thrilling journey of discovery, exploring various meteorological phenomena and engaging in hands-on activities.

As part of the day the students participated in a fantastic incursion in which they had the opportunity to create rain and snow. Additionally, they crafted UV keychains using special beads that changed colour under ultraviolet light, fostering their understanding of the sun's impact on our environment.

Back in their classrooms, our budding scientists continued their weather exploration with a range of engaging activities. They participated in a rain cloud experiment in which they were able to further learn about condensation and precipitation in an interactive way. Through leaf rubbing, they learnt about the structure of leaves and by colouring in snowflakes they were able to appreciate the uniqueness and intricacy of each individual snow crystal.

In the afternoon, we were overjoyed to welcome parents to witness the fruits of their children's scientific endeavours. The enthusiasm displayed by our students was truly remarkable, as they eagerly showcased their newfound knowledge and the results of the day's activities.

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#### **UNEXPLAINED STUDENT ABSENCES**

#### **FACT SHEET FOR PARENTS/CARERS**

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. Online: log the absence directly into Xuno.
- 2. **Telephone:** call the school office and let the staff know your child's name, class, date of absence/s and reason.
- 3. **Email:** email the school and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absence/s and reason.

Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

#### Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and you need to know if your child isn't at school.

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

#### What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school.

#### What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number), the school will attempt to contact any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.
