

# **ENROLMENTS FOR 2024**

As a result of the new timeline that has been introduced by the Department of Education, enrolments for 2024 are now due. If you have a child who will be starting Foundation next year it is important that you speak to our administration team this week to complete enrolment forms so that we can plan for anticipated enrolments. If you have a neighbour, friend or relative who lives within our designated neighbourhood (www.findmyschool.gov.au) we ask you to check that they have enrolled their child. Applications are due by 28th July. If you have any questions, please speak with our administration team.

# **SCHOOL UNIFORM**

Recently at Gaayip-Yagila Primary School, we have noticed some variations of our school uniform, particularly amongst children in Years 3-6. We would like to remind all parents that our school uniform is compulsory. As per our School Uniform policy that is published on our school website, children should be wearing black pants or shorts, the school polo shirt (with the school logo) in Year F-5 or the Year 6 polo for Year 6 students and black jumper or jacket (with the school logo).

Our Winter Tunic with shirt may also be worn. No black, labelled or free dress jumpers should be worn to school either on top or under the uniform.

Please review your child's school uniform to ensure it fits the above requirements. # **STAY WELL THIS WINTER**

In Victoria, influenza (flu) and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) infection numbers are high among children aged 5 to 11 years, particularly in those in their first few years of school. The Victorian Department of Health expects more respiratory infections over Term 3.

Most children with flu or RSV have a mild fever, runny nose or cough. Some children, particularly babies and children with underlying medical conditions, may have more severe illness.

#### Keeping our school community well

Parents, carers and students are encouraged to:

- wash and sanitise their hands regularly
- avoid touching eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands
- cover their nose and mouth when coughing or sneezing
- stay at home if unwell and consult a general practitioner (GP) or NURSE-ON-CALL as needed
- stay up to date with flu and COVID-19 vaccinations.

Our school has masks for staff, students and visitors if they want to wear them.

#### Flu vaccinations

Vaccination is the best way to protect yourself and your family from getting the flu. Annual flu vaccination is recommended for everyone aged 6 months and older. As part of the National Immunisation Program, it is free for:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 6 months and older
- children aged 6 months to under 5 years
- people aged 6 months or older with underlying medical conditions.

Flu vaccinations can be booked through GPs, pharmacies or your local council immunisation service.

# UPCOMING CHANGES TO NAPLAN REPORTING - YEAR 3 AND YEAR 5

Ahead of NAPLAN results for students being released from Monday 17 July 2023, I am writing to inform you of some changes to this year's reporting. These are changes being introduced nationally by the Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA).

NAPLAN will continue to measure student achievement in numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, and grammar and punctuation but the results will now be presented in 4 proficiency levels:

These are:

- exceeding
- strong
- developing
- needs additional support.

This change will give schools, parents and carers clearer information that details student achievement against new proficiency levels.

Students' NAPLAN reports will continue to show how they are tracking against their peers and provide an indication of their skill levels against national averages and where we would expect them to be in order to get the most out of schooling. This provides valuable information to teachers about how we can continue to support your child.

Each set of NAPLAN results is an important milestone but it's also important that students know that one result does not define them – these results are about making sure every student gets the support they need so they can continue to get the best from their learning.

When we provide you with your results, you will also receive information about what the new proficiency levels mean.

# INTERNATIONAL DAY OF FRIENDSHIP

#### When is International Friendship Day 2023?

International Friendship Day 2023 is celebrated on 30th July, and it's recognised on the same day every year.

#### What is International Friendship Day?

In 2011, the UN declared the 30th of July as International Friendship Day. Celebrations of friendship are held across Australia to mark this special day each year.

The UN felt that friendship between peoples, countries, cultures and individuals could be a source of inspiration. Focusing on friendship and human solidarity, they hope to foster peace and build bridges where needed within communities.

#### Sharing the human spirit through friendship

Friendship is regarded as the important gateway that builds bonds and develops camaraderie and trust between people.

The simple action of building friendships is seen as the shift that is urgently needed in society to achieve lasting peace. The UN and UNESCO believe this would put an end to division, poverty, violence, and human rights abuses.

#### How to celebrate International Friendship Day 2023

It's such an important day to take part in. Plus, it's powerful to know that you're contributing towards positive change for everyone.

- Celebrate your friends Show existing friends how special they are. Your children might like to send their pals a <u>personalised card</u> or a note. Your students could even make some friendship bracelets to gift to their friends.
- Socialise You could set aside time during the school day for your students
  to spend quality time together. Children could hang out with their existing
  friends or chat with new people. Use resources such as our <u>Ice Breaker</u>
  <u>Game Cards</u> and <u>Conversation Starter Dice Activity</u> to help your young
  learners along.
- What makes a good friend? Talk about what it means to be a good friend.
   Use this worksheet to help your children think about the qualities they appreciate in their friends. Do they have those qualities too? How do they think they could be a better friend?

 Visit someone - You could link up with a group in the local community, such as a charity or a retirement home. Some of your students could visit them to celebrate International Friendship Day 2023 together, spreading joy within the community.

It was a day filled with exploration, discovery, and the fascinating world of palaeontology!

There were reports of a HUGE blue dinosaur roaming the school grounds on Tuesday and Thursday last week! Did you see this dinosaur on our school grounds?

Last Tuesday and Thursday, our year 1 and 2 students transformed into junior palaeontologists as they embarked on a thrilling adventure, digging up fossils in our very own GYPS sandpit. Equipped with brushes and shovels their eyes sparkled with curiosity and wonder as they delved into the mysteries of the prehistoric era.


The sandpit became a portal to the ancient past, with each scoop of sand revealing hidden treasures from millions of years ago. Our young palaeontologists meticulously brushed away the grains, carefully uncovering fossilized remains of long-extinct creatures. The excitement and joy on their faces were simply priceless.

The activity allowed our Year 1 and Year 2 students to develop a range of skills. They honed their observation skills, analysing the shapes of the fossils to identify the types of dinosaurs they belonged to. As you can imagine, the day was a roaring success, sparking a deep interest in palaeontology among our learners across the school as many fossils were yet to be found.


