

### LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Families.

Welcome to Term 4 Week 8. The end of the year is fast approaching and we are now only a month away from Christmas. Students have continued to engage in learning and extra-curricular activities. Last week our Year 1 students enjoyed a fabulous day at the Melbourne Zoo, Year 2 students have begun their swimming program this week and our Foundation students are eagerly awaiting to go on their first excursion to Diggers Rest Farm next week. The success of these programs is a partnership with our families. We thank the many volunteers who have attended these events and assisted in making the day run smoothly.

Last week we held a rehearsal for an onsite emergency evacuation drill. All staff, students and visitors were involved in the drill to simulate a real scenario. The process was undertaken in a calm and orderly manner and all participants were accounted for in 11 minutes and 5 seconds. The use of safety lines when moving around the school is a pre-arranged strategy that ensures that in the event of an evacuation the process can occur with greater efficiency. When completing a rehearsal, there is a drill observer who identifies areas for improvement. We have taken on this feedback and will make modifications moving forward.

Our Billy G's Cookie Dough fundraiser has ended. **670** tubs were purchased. Delivery will be on Friday 1st December. We will be in contact with families who have placed large orders to enable collection at a suitable time. Thanks to Sarah Fear for organising this event.

Recently, a number of students have been arriving to school quite early in the morning and are unsupervised at the front of the school. A reminder that our gates open at 8.40am, with classroom doors opening at 8.50am and learning beginning at 9.00am. Student who arrive before 8.40am will need to attend before school care to ensure that they are safe and supervised. Whilst staff are onsite they are not 'on-duty' until 8.40am when the gates open. We thank you for your understanding and co-operation.

#### **2024 Parent Payment Information**

2024 Parent Payment information was provided to families on Tuesday 21st November via Xuno. A hard copy payment slip was also provided to the eldest in the family. The ongoing support of our families ensures that our school can offer the best possible education for our students. If you did not receive this information or you have misplaced the payment slip please speak with our administration team. Thank you to our families who have returned their payment slip and already made a payment.

Preferred payment is via BPay or Credit Card. The last day for cash payments in 2023 will be Friday 15th December. Credit Card payments will be accepted at the administration office until the end of term.

#### Planning for 2024

At present, we are planning for approximately 1050 students across 50 classes in 2024. This will see a decline in our current enrolment due to the opening of Yabup PS. Whilst our student enrolment is declining, we will see an increase in the number of classes to ensure we continue to allow for growth throughout the year. In 2024, we anticipate having the following class structure:

- Foundation (eight classes)
- Year One (ten classes)
- Year Two (eight classes)
- Year Three (eight classes)
- Year Four (six classes)
- Year Five (five classes)
- Year Six (five classes)
- Specialist subjects: The Arts, Physical Education, Science, Library
- Support roles: Learning Support, Tutor Program, Mental Health Initiative in Primary Schools

With an increase in the number of classes and with some staffing changes, vacancies have been advertised. We know that parents/carers and students are always keen to see the teaching arrangements for the new school year. We continue to work on the development of the school's workforce plan and will share this information with our community after our whole school transition day on Tuesday 12th December.

Our teachers started working through the 2024 class creation process where we have ensured that all students are in a class with a nominated friend. Students will be advised of their teacher at the Whole School Transition day on Tuesday 12th December.

In support of our planning processes for next year, we continue to liaise closely with families in regards to all confirmed enrolments for 2024, as well as those families who may be leaving the school. If you are moving to another school, could you please notify the administration team as soon as possible.

#### Capital Works Project

In consultation with the Victorian School Building Authority (VSBA) I am delighted to share images of our Capital Works project. In May 2022, Gaayip-Yagila Primary School received \$11.201 million to expand the permanent capacity of our school to 825 places to reduce the need for temporary, relocatable buildings.

Working alongside Design Inc and Brand Architects (the team who designed our current state of the art education facility), we have created a contemporary plan that complements the current design by ensuring key visual aspects of the buildings have been maintained. Our new two-storey building will include 4 learning neighbourhoods each with 2 classrooms, collaborative space and storytelling space. Additionally, there are also 2 specialist learning areas and a library / large flexible learning area. Consideration has also been given to incorporate outdoor learning and play spaces, as well as a yarning circle.

Our School Council have also supported the project and contributed additional funding to enable the building to be energy efficient with the inclusion of solar panels.

Expected completion of the project is Q4 2024.

#### **Teacher Professional Learning**

Our staff are committed to ongoing learning and improving our practices. This term, teachers have been upskilling their knowledge of the High Impact Wellbeing Teaching Strategies.

### Building Relationships with Students by Mel Adams (Mental Health and Wellbeing Leader)

Whole school teaching staff have been deepening their understanding of the High Impact Wellbeing Strategies, these are 7 evidence-informed strategies that have a significant effect on student wellbeing. The High Impact Wellbeing Strategies empower teachers with the knowledge and skills to build student wellbeing. The High Impact Wellbeing Strategies are part of the Victorian Teaching and Learning Model and are a companion to the High Impact Teaching Strategies, contributing to effective instructional practice.

In our last professional learning session, teachers developed their understanding of the High Impact Wellbeing Strategy 1 – Build Relationships with Students. A positive teacher–student relationship plays an important role in student wellbeing and forms a foundation for effective teaching and learning. Teachers can build relationships with authentic efforts to get to know their students and their needs.

Teachers developed a 'Relationship Web' of their own classroom to reflect on the different ways they have built relationships with the students within their classroom over the year, fostering engagement. Teachers then presented these webs in cross-year teaching teams using a Thinking Routine Protocol to share different strategies and skills teachers have used in their classrooms to build authentic teacher-student relationships.

The High Impact Wellbeing Strategies alongside the High Impact Teaching Strategies can be used by every teacher in every classroom and by teams of teachers collaborating to promote student learning and wellbeing. The Department Framework (FISO 2.0) places wellbeing alongside learning as a fundamental student outcome of education.






#### Year 1 and 2

#### Year 3 and 4



#### Year 5 and 6


The cosmos has come alive in our Grade 5 and 6 classrooms as our students embark on an interplanetary adventure, focusing their attention on the mysterious and captivating red planet—Mars. In recent weeks, our young astronomers have been comparing Mars to Earth, investigating the possibilities of sustaining life on Mars, and honing their communication skills for the vastness of space. Excitement is building as we anticipate our upcoming excursion to the Victorian Space Science Education Centre. The curiosity of our Grade 5 and 6 students knows no bounds as they delve into the similarities and differences between Mars and Earth.

From the composition of the atmosphere to the geological features of the Martian landscape, our budding scientists are gaining a deeper understanding of the unique characteristics that make Mars a distinctive neighbour in our solar system. They are learning about the technologies and methods used for communication in space, from radio waves to satellite communication. What does it take to survive on the Red Planet? Our students are tackling this question head-on as they engage in imaginative and practical exercises to design habitats and systems that could support human life on Mars. We look forward to our upcoming excursion to the Victorian Space Science Education Centre. This hands-on experience will provide our students with the opportunity to apply their knowledge in a simulated space environment, engage in interactive activities, and further fuel their passion for space exploration.

### **VISUAL ARTS NEWS**

As we are now halfway through Term 4 here in Visual Arts, we're looking at consolidating the learning we have done throughout the year and focusing on the Elements of Art such as line, shape, colour and form.

Foundation and Year 1 students have started the base for three-dimensional line sculptures by practicing naming lines and drawing them with paint slicks. Next week we will learn how to fold and twist paper to create different types of three-dimensional lines.

Year 2, 3 and 4 students are practicing naming, drawing and cutting different types of lines, as well as using line, shape and tone to create patterns. They're creating patterned paper this week to cut out and turn into 3D sculptures next week.

The Year 5/6 students are combining their understanding of line, shape, form and balance, to create three-dimensional relief sculptures. Students are creating origami pieces which they are assembling into forms which show their understanding of radial symmetry.

### **2024 CLASSES**

Our classes for next year will be formed with the following priorities:

- Students with at least one peer from their nominated 'who you work well with' list.
- Classes with a balance of;
  - Students working 'above', 'at' and 'working towards' academic level.
  - Gender.

Our classes for next year, including teachers, will be announced on the state-wide transition day, Tuesday 12th December. All students will have an opportunity to spend time with their new class and teacher on this day.

In my experience, this process is comprehensive, considerate and best prepares our students for a positive start to the following school year. Of course, on occasion, there might be some disappointment for a few of our students. They might miss a particular friend or be anxious about leaving a favourite teacher. As the adults, it is our responsibility to support them through this. I am aware of occasions at other settings where families have made requests regarding their child's class following the 'orientation day'. To be clear, that will not happen at our school. Instead, if there is some initial disappointment, we will enact our school values and work collaboratively with kindness and respect to ensure our students and families feel supported and prepared for the transition into 2024.

As you can appreciate class placement is a very complex undertaking, especially in light of our total school enrolment in excess of 1000 students for 2024. At Gaayip-Yagila Primary School, we strongly believe it is essential for children to have the opportunity to make new friends, as this experience often leads to wonderful new friendships and stronger social skills.

### 12 MONTHS FREE INTERNET AT HOME

### Support your childs education

The Australian Government has established the School Student Broadband Initiative to provide free home internet for one year for up to 30,000 eligible families with school-aged students.

The initiative aims to boost education opportunities. NBN Co is leading the rollout of this initiative across the country.

#### How the School Student Broadband Initiative can help your child

Children who can access online learning at home as part of their education are more likely to engage in classroom activities.

Access to fast internet at home can also support children to build their digital skills, learn how to safely use the internet and take part in a world that is more reliant on digital technology.

#### Eligibility

To be eligible, families must:

- have a child living at home enrolled in an Australian school in 2023
- not have an active National Broadband Network internet service at their home\* (having a mobile internet service does not affect eligibility)
- live in a premises that can access the National Broadband Network through a standard connection. NBN Co will check this for you after you apply
- register interest with your school and complete a consent form to be assessed for eligibility.

\*If an address has been disconnected within 14 days prior to an eligibility check – the address will be classified as ineligible. There may be cases where exceptions can be made, please contact the School Student Broadband Initiative team at SSBI@education.vic.gov.au to discuss further.

### 12 MONTHS FREE INTERNET AT HOME

### Support your childs education

#### How the School Student Broadband Initiative works

If you are eligible, your home internet service will be provided at no cost for one year with a participating internet provider over the National Broadband Network. Each internet provider has its own step-by-step process to get you connected, which may involve you providing identification.

Once you sign up, the internet provider will help you set up your connection. The initiative does not include devices such as a computer or tablet. Other members of your household can use the internet service provided through this initiative.

The one-year period will start from the day your service is activated with your chosen provider. At the end of the one-year period, you will not be placed onto a paid service by your internet provider without your consent. The Australian Government is considering options beyond the one-year free period.

### How to apply

- Ask your school for a copy of the School Student Broadband Initiative consent form.
- Complete the consent form and return to the school.
- NBN Co will use student address details on the consent form to confirm eligibility.
- If you are eligible, NBN Co will issue a voucher for your family to use to sign up with a participating internet provider. This will be provided to you by your school.

Please note: NBN Co will review the home address for eligibility. No personal information other than your main home address will be shared with NBN Co. Please see the consent form for details about how personal information will be used.
